 - Aug. 2022: WCC community voted on final topic
 - Sept. 2022: Survey results announced

- Nov. 2022: Formation of QEP Implementation Committee
 - Fall 2022: Re-analysis of survey comments
 - Feb. 2023: Student focus groups conducted
 - Spring 2023: Initial development of PACK Peer Mentoring program
 - Oct. 2023: Formation of Marketing and Budget Teams
 - Dec. 2023: Formation of Assessment Team
 - Spring 2024: Marketing campaign began
 - Fall 2024: Slow rollout of PACK Peer Mentoring program, mentor recruitment, and orientation

A peer mentor who is an excellent listener learns about the mentee's:

- story
- concerns
- needs

LEARNING COACH

A peer mentor who is an excellent learning coach talks to their mentees about:

- Time management
- Active reading and learning strategies
- Mentee's goals and motivation



How can faculty help this program to succeed?

- If you are an English or Math instructor, refer mentees!
 - Any WCC student (including CCP, early college)
- Let the coordinators know if mentors need additional training/knowledge.
- Let the coordinators know about successes. (We need qualitative data!)

Stages of the PACK Peer Mentoring Program

Introduction of Peer Mentoring Program

Current students, recommended by faculty, were invited to become a mentor. Mentors received training August 12.

Current and new students were introduced to the peer mentoring program and offered the opportunity to enroll.

Matching

Mentees self-selected a mentor based on their interests and needs.

Mentees signed up for Remind, a text and app based communication platform that will manage mentoring-related communication.

Orientation

On September 11, coordinators hosted an orientation for all participants to allow them to:

- get to know each other
- discuss the mentees' goals
- understand the mentoring process and the role of the mentor and mentee
- get resources

Ongoing Relationship

Mentors will regularly check in with mentees.

Coordinators will regularly check in with mentors to determine progress and continue to serve as a resource for the mentor.

Mentors and mentees will attend two more events hosted by the coordinators.

Assessment

Coordinators will administer surveys to mentors and mentees to determine their sense of belonging through the mentoring program.

Coordinators will collect data on mentees' progress in their courses.

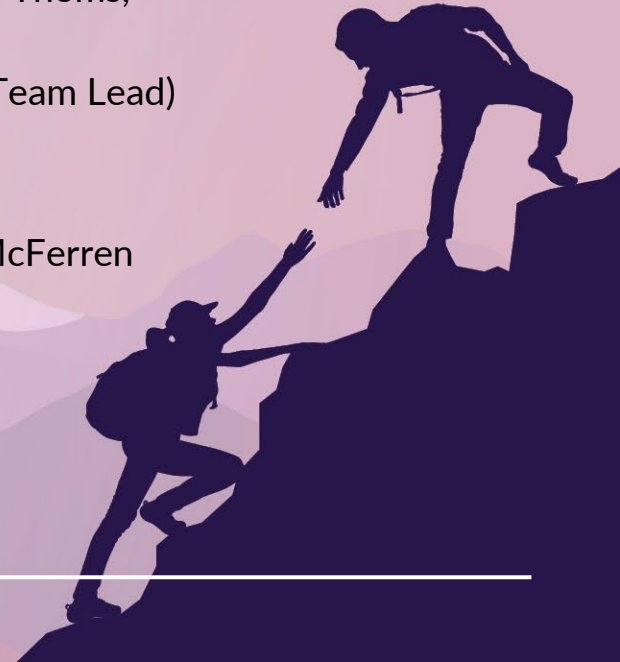
